BEFORE THE HOUSE BUSINESS AFFAIRS AND LABOR COMMITTEE  
ON HB 22-1001: REDUCE FEES FOR BUS FILINGS**

Thank you Chairman Roberts, and Members of the Committee:

My name is Lindsey Vigoda and I'm the Colorado Director for Small Business Majority, a small business organization with offices nationwide, including here in Colorado. Our mission is to empower America's diverse entrepreneurs to build a thriving and equitable economy. I am here to share our support for HB 22-1001, legislation requiring the transfer of funds from the general fund to the department of state's cash fund in order to reduce business-related fees for aspiring and current entrepreneurs in Colorado.

Colorado is a national leader in small business growth, with more than 674,000 small businesses, employing 1.2 million Coloradans. But we'd be remiss if we didn't take into account how much the COVID-19 pandemic has overwhelmed our entrepreneurs and hampered their economic success. As we near the second anniversary of the COVID-19 pandemic, many small businesses in Colorado have either closed their doors for good or suffered severe declines in revenue.
